Overarching Questions

- 1. Caste, class, race, genocide definitions, differences, inter-relationships. Similarities and differences between India's caste system, Nazi Germany, U.S. slavery, European colonization world-wide and treatment of indigenous peoples.
- 2. Do humans have an inherent biological drive and/or need for some form of social hierarchy?
- 3. Are we really ready to level the playing field for all humans all 7.8 billion of us? Are we ready to compete for or share food, shelter, health care, resources, wealth, status, quality of life with that many people? What does a level playing field look like for us who are at the top of the heap compared to billions of people?
- 4. How do people in other economic levels, social levels, or caste levels feel about this? Women compared to men? 1% vs 5% vs 20 % vs 50% vs 90% vs 95%? First world vs third world? Races and nationalities? Political and social systems?
- 5. Are we really trying to do away with caste (social hierarchy) or are we trying to raise the quality of life and opportunity for people at the lower levels and remove obstacles to upward mobility?
- 6. Should we be doing more to teach our children/citizens about the dark, cruel, bigoted history of our country so that all people know, reject and banish these behaviors? How can this be done? Has it worked elsewhere how?
- 7. Have you experienced or observed situations where caste assumptions or stereotypes have been part of the interactions?
